Earlier in 2024, we saw the TicWatch Pro 5 Enduro released, and now, the TicWatch Atlas is right here. Mobvoi must feel prefer it struck gold with the design of the TicWatch Pro 5, [BloodVitals SPO2](#) as the company has basically released three smartwatches which might be almost equivalent, [BloodVitals review](#) together with the TicWatch Atlas. Despite the identify change, is the Atlas really all that completely different from the Enduro? Or is Mobvoi just making an attempt to launch something new for the sake of it? Mobvoi introduced the TicWatch Atlas in October 2024, arriving virtually six months after the Pro 5 Enduro. It's nonetheless solely obtainable in a single measurement, however there you may choose both the Black or Silver coloration method. The Atlas is priced at \$349. It's at the moment out there from Mobvoi straight, Amazon, and a few different on-line retailers. Everything that the Atlas offers, just works, so I simply really haven't found much to complain about. It also helps that the Atlas continues Mobvoi's reign as the "battery champ" for wearables. Well, at the very least those that do not price more than \$500. I like having the ability to have a smartwatch that lasts for 2 to a few days at a minimum however often lasts even longer.

As I've said in my previous TicWatch critiques, I'm an enormous fan of the scale, even if it is not for everyone. Thankfully, for me, at least, that pattern continues with the Atlas, as the watch simply rests nicely on my wrist. Although I do should point out that I want there were more 24mm bands to choose from, that's not Mobvoi's fault. That is all made attainable by Mobvoi's dual-display screen display, combining a 1.43-inch OLED display with an Ultra low-power display.
